Today, people can visit a store and purchase embroidery or sewing patterns. In the Victorian era, the same could be said for hair art patterns! Hair art was a common craft for women. Sentimentality was important in this era, and one of its manifestations was using a loved one's hair to create art or jewelry. While mourning hair art was common to remember those who passed, women also created hair art as sentimental tributes to the living.



This particular piece of hair art (pictured on the top left - close-up on bottom left) is from an unknown source. It was created using a technique called gimp work, in which individual pieces of hair are looped around wire and eventually shaped into designs.

It is unclear whether or not this piece was for mourning. As you can see from the different hair colors, it was likely created from multiple people's hair. This gives a clue that it was not for mourning, but rather as a sentimental family tree. However, a fragment of a handwritten letter accompanies the hair art. A section of it reads,

"But, poor soul! He will never ate or drink anymore, and we haven't a [?] relation in the world except myself and yer two cousins who were kilt in the last war. I cannot dwell on the mournful subject any longer, and shall..." [end of letter fragment]


Perhaps the hair art is mourning multiple family members who passed.

LETTER FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD

As I sit here at the greeter's desk of the Shrimping Museum overlooking the Amelia River I see ominous clouds peeking above the far horizon. And I smile because not only are these clouds the early warning sign of an afternoon rainstorm, they are also harbingers of an influx of visitors to the Museum. It has rained almost daily for the past five weeks and, as a result, Museum attendance has far exceeded expectation, resulting in our financial bottom line beginning to look better. After 18 months of limited access due to Covid, we are now operating at about 90 percent. The last two boxes remaining to be checked off are opening on Sunday afternoons and reinstating the Pub Crawl. Given the recent increase in Covid cases, the Pub Crawl will remain in hiatus for awhile. However, we are hoping to open on Sundays in the next few weeks. Our biggest hurdle at this time is finding volunteers to staff the greeter desk and provide Docent tours. Many of our volunteers decided not

to return when we reopened in April and we have been playing catch-up ever since. Those volunteers who remain are constantly being asked to work additional shifts, sometimes three or four times a week. So if you (or a friend) are interested in helping out, even if you can only afford one morning or afternoon a week, please contact our Education Director Thea Seagraves at 904-261-7378 x 105.

While our number of volunteers is limited, it has not stopped Phyllis and her staff, as well as the Board of Trustees, from moving forward. Three exciting events will be taking place this fall. Coming in September will be our third Fiesta de Santa Maria in which we celebrate Spanish arrival in the New World. In coordination with the Farmers' Market, a fiesta will take place on Saturday morning, September 18 behind Pineland Bank. A Spanish guitarist, flamenco dancers and interpretive historical volunteers in costume will ensure a morning of fun for the whole family.

Continuing on with the theme of Latino Heritage will be our Cuban Art Exhibit. Using her contacts in Cuba, Board Member Berta Arias is coordinating an exhibition of original works by artists from the city of Baracoa, Cuba. We are not able to display the original artworks. However, with help from the Cuban coordinators, we have high quality photos of each piece, and those images will be printed as posters. These posters will be on display in the Museum's temporary gallery from September 17th through November 30th. Berta has arranged for four local artists to judge the submissions and make monetary awards for first, second, and third place. In addition, with the artists' agreement, we plan to auction off the posters with proceeds being shared between the artists and the Museum. Finally, we are trying to arrange for one of our 3rd on 3rd presentations to be a video-conference with the Cuban artists and the local judges. Stay tuned for future developments.

The third event we are planning for is the City's fall shrimp festival. Taking place October 1-3, the scaled-down festival "Falling for Shrimp" will only occupy blocks from Third Street to the riverfront and is expected to draw about half the visitors. As in the past, we will be hosting a booth and serving our fabulous shrimp gumbo. We are currently recruiting cooks to prepare the gumbo. Over the next two month we will be looking for volunteers to peel shrimp (free wine served while peeling), set up the tent, and work in the booth as cook, server or money taker. Upon retiring from teaching in Georgia, she and her husband bought a house in the historic district of downtown Fernandina. Interested in the history of Nassau County and Amelia Island, Lynn decided the Amelia Island Museum of History would be a great place to devote her free time while learning about our island's fascinating history. "Living downtown is like living in history," says Lynn, who became one of the museum's morning greeters. After serving as a morning greeter for several years, Lynn was asked to become a chairperson for the museum's Holiday Home Tour (HHT), an annual fundraiser that highlights homes here on Amelia Island. Lynn served as co-chair for the HHT for the past two years and has done an amazing job. She now spends her extra time as a "garden angel" nurturing the history garden located directly behind the museum.
